

²⁶ He also said, "This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground. ²⁷ Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how. ²⁸ All by itself the soil produces grain—first the stalk, then the head, then the full kernel in the head. ²⁹ As soon as the grain is ripe, he puts the sickle to it, because the harvest has come" (Mark 4:26-29).



Passages like this make me wonder if Jesus really understood farming. I mean, really: "All by itself the soil produces grain?" Doesn't Jesus know how much work the farmer does? The farmer must choose seeds, monitor the weather, plant at just the right time, hire enough hands, water the plants, spray for weeds, apply fertilizer, and more! There is an awful lot of work that goes into farming! Doesn't Jesus know that?

But Jesus is not talking about sugar beets, corn, or soybeans. Jesus is talking about the souls of the world. As children of God baptized into God's family, we are called to give the same attention to the souls of the world as a farmer gives

to his field. Just as a farmer knows when to plant, water, fertilize, or spray, we are called to discern when to share the Gospel, visit someone sick or lonely, bring food to the hungry, and love someone through a tragedy.

We are God's hands and feet in the world. Unlike a farmer's fields, we don't always know how faith grows. But we are called to nurture faith just the same.

God of the harvest, please bless our earth and our farmers in this season of harvest. You know just the right pieces that will make this year's harvest bountiful. Help us to see the world through your eyes. Give us eyes for the harvest of the world and teach us how to nurture faith in ourselves and one another. Amen.

In Matthew 9:37-38, Jesus talks about the great harvest waiting for workers and he says, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Was Jesus waiting for laborers to come help take in the grain or whatever harvest they were working on at that time? Were they really short of help like so many of our businesses today? Our local farmers work feverishly at

this time of year to gather in their crops before winter and additional hands can hurry this along. All year long they labor growing and tending their crops. Harvest is the time when it all hopefully pays off. Jesus may have considered all of this when he spoke but I think he had an even more important message to convey.

If we read a little further back into this story, at verse 35 we learn about the type of people Jesus was encountering. He had been traveling and meeting individuals who were "harassed and helpless" like lost sheep, sheep without a shepherd. And he used a story, as he often did, to remind his followers that they could be "farmers of men," revealing the story of salvation to everyone and bringing home a harvest of Christians.



Today's world isn't much different. There are many people who are lost and unfulfilled. As Christians, we are to go out into our fields (neighborhoods and the world) and collect those crops (people who don't know Jesus). We need to tell them about Jesus and pray that God will send more workers (missionaries, lay ministers, pastors, Sunday School teachers) to help us spread the word of salvation. It's not always necessary to go abroad; we can be missionaries in our own communities spreading the word about Jesus to those around us.

We pray for our farmers, their families, and all those who help with the harvest of the actual fields. We also pray that we can become workers of the harvest to those around us helping to spread God's word! *LouAnn Lee*


