

What is an "Intern Pastor"?



I cannot say thank you enough for allowing me to serve my internship at Galchutt and Emmanuel Lutheran Churches. I have been a seminary student for three and a half years and am nearing the end of my journey. Internship is an incredible time of growth and discovery. This is the first time I have served as a pastor, and internship allows me to learn how a church operates, to experiment with leadership, and to learn and grow through my mistakes. Thank you for helping me through that process. Truly, it could not be done without you!

In the meantime, you get a pastor. Not a fully developed and ordained pastor, but a minister-intraining authorized by the synod to preach, lead worship, perform baptisms, lead funerals, do visits, and preside over communion. It has been an honor to be called to serve these churches. Again, thank you for allowing me to step into this sacred role in your church.

My seminary journey will end with graduation and ordination. I finish my internship on September 6, 2020, and graduate in December 2020. On the road to becoming an ordained pastor, I must be approved by the seminary and the synod before being assigned to a region of the country where I will look for my first call. My Approval is scheduled for August 2020. I will be assigned in late September and will begin looking for my first call in October 2020. Because of this process, I am unable to consider a call with any congregation until after I have been assigned. After I am assigned, I intend to follow the formal steps of call in which I submit my paperwork to the synod and interview with multiple congregations.

Isaiah 30:21 reminds us, "Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying, 'This is the way; walk in it.'" The call process is put forward for both ministers and congregations to allow intentional, prayerful discernment about the future. No matter what the future holds, scripture assures us that God is at work, directing our steps, and bringing about his kingdom and will in the world. I am interested to see what God has in store for the future of your churches as well as for me. I know you are also in the process of calling a Pastor. This is, indeed, a holy and uncertain time for us all. If you have questions about your own call process, please have your call committee connect with Shar Gumke in the synod office.

We live in a time of turbulent change within the church and the world. As such, we pray that God would keep his eyes on our future. May God give us the peace and comfort to look to the future with confidence. God's eyes are on us all. May he bring about his will both now and forever. Amen.

Four Chaplains Sunday -

Traditionally, the first Sunday in February is Four Chaplains Sunday. The story of the four chaplains is compelling, highlighting the faith, courage, and spirit of interfaith cooperation that chaplains are called to exhibit in caring for service members and their families. On Feb. 3, 1943, the converted luxury liner Dorchester was struck by a torpedo while crossing the North Atlantic; the ship sank within 20 minutes. Hundreds of U.S. troops and civilians were aboard the ship when it was struck, and as passengers were scurrying to lifeboats, four chaplains—the Rev. George Fox (Methodist), Rabbi Alexander Good (Jewish), the Rev. Clark Poling (Dutch Reformed) and Fr. John Washington (Roman Catholic)—spread out and began helping the wounded and panicked. Amid the chaos, the four chaplains were calmly offering prayers and encouraging words. When life jackets ran out, the chaplains already had given their own to others fleeing the ship. The four men joined arms and said prayers, singing hymns as they sank with the ship.

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February is the month most people associate with "love." However, if you were to search the origin of Valentine's Day, you would find accounts that are actually rather dark in nature. Modern times, on the other hand, has molded Valentine's Day into a commercial event in which gifts and

cards are used to demonstrate our affection. I'm not sure that either of these would resonate with Jesus.

Jesus spent so much of his ministry preaching of love in its many forms, telling us how it was God's command that we love each other. When he said this, he wasn't just talking about nice thoughts or sweet gifts for others but something much more demanding, something that REALLY comes from the



heart. This isn't always easy but we can find examples of people who do live this conspicuous kind of love, sometimes in rather creative ways.

Recently, a movie has been released starring Tom Hanks as the late Fred McFeely Rogers, a television personality who, after graduating from seminary and becoming a Presbyterian minister, attended graduate school for child development. His goal in life was to minister to children and their families through television rather than in the normal church setting. He likely reached an audience who didn't even realize the goal of his ministry.

Fred Rogers had many wise sayings regarding love, such as, "Love isn't a state of perfect caring. It is an active noun like struggle. To love someone is to strive to accept that person exactly the way he or she is, right here and now." Rogers, someone who always seemed to focus on acceptance and equal treatment for everyone, also said, "When we love a person, we accept him or her exactly as is: the lovely with the unlovely, the strong with the fearful, the true mixed in with the façade, and of course, the only way we can do it is by accepting ourselves that way." Unfortunately all of us at times have a hard time following those words of wisdom. In these times of such diversity, we often struggle to accept others who may hold different religious or political beliefs, who may look different, act differently or come from a different socio-economic status. We allow petty issues to divide us when Jesus just asks us to empathize and show love.

As we make an effort to be more accepting of others, may we be reminded of the words found in John 15:12: "My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you." LouAnn Lee



While using play therapy with young cancer patients, social worker Amy Jandrisevits found that kids identify best with dolls that resemble them — yet doll diversity was rare.

As described in Gather magazine, she launched a line called "A Doll Like Me" that customizes dolls not only to "a child's ethnicity, gender, hair color and interests, but also their physical characteristics such as clefts, birthmarks, scars and limb differences." She adds, "It is more than just a doll to a child; it is a representation of We are allthe child who owns it." So far, Jandrisevits has made 300+ dolls for kids worldwide a project she considers to be a ministry.

Lent, the churchyear season that


begins on Ash Wednesday, is a time of penitence and spiritual renewal. Some people give up a luxury or vice during Lent as a form of self-denial; others undertake a project that benefits others.

The point isn't to denigrate ourselves or to see how much we can do without. Instead, Lent helps us reflect on Jesus' death. As Timothy Keller writes in The Reason for God: "The Christian Gospel is that I am so flawed that Jesus had to die for me, yet I am so loved and valued that Jesus was glad to die for me. This leads to deep humility and deep confidence at the same time. It undermines both swaggering and sniveling. I cannot feel superior to anyone, and yet I have nothing to prove to anyone. I do not think more of myself nor less of myself. Instead, I think of myself less."
