The Power of Community

On the fifth floor of Fargo's newest Sanford hospital is a very curious counter. This counter is full of coins delicately balanced on their edge. They are not glued or fake! Each is delicately placed and balanced until something else knocks it down.

When I was a hospital Chaplain, the strangeness of this scene caught my eye whenever I walked past, but I never stopped to set one up. I was afraid I would knock down all the other coins or be judged by a passerby. One day, I finally mustered the courage and tried it. It is not easy! Try it yourself!

Soon it was my custom to set up at least one coin each day. Over time, I realized these coins were not so different from the patients I visited. Each patient had been "knocked over" in life and sought to get their life back into balance. As a Chaplain, I got to be part of the medical team who gently helps each "coin" back into position. With care, concern, and intentionality, we do our best to help each patient and their families to stand up again and find healing. Just like the coins, some lives take more work to balance than others and, unfortunately, some "coins" are so aged or battered they are unable to be set up at all.

This is also the call of a good community. In many ways, God calls us all to "set people upright." Different than "setting people straight," to set someone upright means to help bring their life back into balance during hardship. Each of us is "set up" and ready for life until life's storms - illness, grief, job loss, marriage problems, parenting stressors, bullying, finances, addiction, aging, etc. - come and knock us down.



Scripture encourages us to bear one another's burdens (Gal. 6:2), to build one another up (1 Thes. 5:11), and to love one another as God has loved us (John 13:34-35). We don't have to be medical professionals to join God's work. How unique that, as Christians, we get to reach out and help those around us AND get helped by the body of Christ when the storms of life knock us over.

Jesus, open our eyes to see the lives that are "knocked over" around us. Give us the courage, wisdom, and strength to set them upright with care and intention. And

Lord, please bring people into our own lives when we are knocked down and remind of your presence in our darkest moments. Amen.



The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully (2 Corinthians 9:6).

Ash Wednesday, February 26th this year, marks the beginning of Lent, the 40 days of preparation for the Easter season when Christians are called to deepen their spiritual lives. It is believed that involvement in these practices, like exercise we do to improve our physical health, improves our spiritual well-being by shedding all that is unnecessary in our life. Maybe this year we could try something new and go beyond the usual practice of "giving up" something and instead try "taking up" something - something we normally would not do that could help us and, in certain cases, the community around us. Something that may even take us out of our comfort zone!

- Try a new spiritual practice. Read a chapter of the Bible or a few scriptures each day. Spend at least one hour in silent meditation each weekend. For all of us so tempted to look at our phones or computers, that could be a combination of giving up something and taking up something else.
- Instead of turning on a streaming service for your next binge-watching session or storm day, read the entire Gospel of Mark in one sitting. As the shortest Gospel, it is a concise story of Jesus' life.
- Unplug from your phone or turn off your car radio on your drive to work or town. The silence
 may be jarring at first, but you may find that you are able to concentrate better and will be more
 observant of your surroundings.
- Spend at least one weekend or evening volunteering during Lent. Serve a meal at your local homeless shelter or church-related event. Volunteer at the food pantry.
- Take something on for each of the 40 days of Lent 40 days of letter writing, 40 acts of kindness, 40 phone calls to the important people in your life. The list is endless. Something as simple as sharing a kind word or a smile with someone may change that person's day.

God doesn't only use the pastors or priests to get his work done. God uses all kinds of people to get His work done, most of whom will never be famous for the work they do. He can use us right now, wherever we are and whoever we are. He has given us gifts and abilities but it is our job to "use" those gifts. The Bible says, "When He ascended on high, He ... gave gifts to His people" (Ephesians 4:8).

Lent is a time for restoring balance to our lives. The Eskimos practice balance as they venture into freezing Arctic waters in little boats. If you've ever paddled a kayak, you know how easy they are to tip. Thankfully, kayaks are just as easy to turn back upright.

That isn't a bad image for Lent — or for life as a whole. Whatever spiritual disciplines we adopt, if we succumb to temptation, it's no biggie. One of the lessons of Lent is that, as long as we're traveling light, it takes only a quick twist of the paddle to right us. That paddle twist might take the form of a quick but heartfelt prayer: "Jesus, set me straight again!" Or it might mean some extra time set aside for quiet meditation with God. Don't get worried if your spiritual discipline fails now and then. Just let Jesus help you get upright once more, and keep paddling!

Greetings from Janel, LWR's new Quilt & Kit Ministry Manager

Dear Friends,

I learned to crochet sitting hip-to-hip with my grandmother on the living room sofa. She kept her hands busy with needle and yarn fashioning snuggly masterpieces morning and night. Every time I visited, we'd get down to business with our projects — she with skill and precision, and me with my fingers tripping over my crochet hook. Even more important than what we created with our hands was the beautiful, loving connection we built in our hearts.

This love is what drew me to the <u>LWR Quilt & Kit Ministry</u>. Your quilt is God's love wrapped around a refugee's shoulders. Your School Kit accompanies a child into the classroom with the message, "There is hope and a future." Your Personal Care Kit tells its recipient, "You are precious and cared for." These gifts of love echo around the world in ways only God can make possible.

I was recently at an Ingathering in Michigan, where they told me about a truck driver who had arrived at a past Ingathering to transport a shipment of quilts to our warehouse. When he learned what was in the boxes, he was blown away. Years ago, he said, when he was living in a refugee camp, he received an LWR Quilt when he had nothing else left. That day he got a chance to bless others in the same way. That's not coincidence — that's God perfect love.

I, too, have been a beneficiary of the deep love of our community. In October, I visited the quilters at Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. During my visit, they presented me with a gorgeous prayer quilt they had made just for me, to welcome me into my new role. What they didn't know was that my grandmother had passed away just weeks before. To me, that quilt was love — I could feel my grandmother in its stitches and the comfort of our Holy God hemming me in. When you put your faith in action, God knows just what to do with it.

I have enjoyed getting to know many of you personally over the last couple of months, and I am so grateful for the warm welcome you have extended to me. Pastor Meggie opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. Kevin called the meeting to order. There was no secretary report.

Old Business: No old business was discussed.

New Business: Lent season we will alternate services at both churches and begin this Wednesday with Ash Wednesday in Galchutt at 7 PM. - **ONE light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended;
- ** TWO or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping;
- **ONE adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging (Multi-packs can be separated).
