Good Soil

I love gardening. There is something special about working with seeds and ground and—after a lot of hard work—watching food grow! There is something unique about the process: all of that plowing, planting, watering, pruning, and fertilizer somehow magically creates food. And food enough for a whole community!

Growing food is not easy. But neither is growing faith. In Mark 4:3-8, Jesus talks about letting our hearts be "good soil." He describes a farmer planting on various types of soil: some seeds fall on the path and are eaten by the birds, some seeds fall on rocky ground, some seeds are choked by weeds, and some land on good soil. It is the good soil, of course, that is looked for. Good soil produces an abundant crop. Good soil in our hearts produces the fruit of the Spirit.

But the truth is, we will never have perfect soil here on earth. Think about your own garden or fields. No matter what you do, there will always be weeds, rocks, pests, wet spells, dry spells and more that will keep you from the perfect crop.

The same is true in our own lives. Sometimes a particular sinful behavior creeps into our lives and threatens control. Sometimes other people hurl their hurt onto us. Sometimes our broken world throws trials at us that bring us down. All too often, we are so busy fighting to grow that we forget to stop and listen for the voice of God.

And yet, while we may never have "perfect soil" for our faith, this doesn't mean our faith cannot produce fruit. The spirit of God encourages us towards love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5:22) no matter our circumstances!

And then God's grace picks us up when we fail.

So, what does the soil of your heart look like?

- Does it need nurturing—water, rest, and fertilizer—so faith can to grow? Does it need tilling? You've heard the Word, but it has not sunk in?
- Is it choked by sin: the wrongful actions you have done or the hurtful actions imposed on you?

Wherever you are today, God reaches out and offers a chance at a new beginning. *Lord, may our hearts be good soil.* Peace, Intern Pr. Meggie

Greetings to you all-





Mrs. Martin, a poet, began to jot down her ideas from that conversation and the text of the song "His Eye is on the Sparrow" was completed that same day. The familiar chorus goes as follows:

Likewise, in Matthew 6:26 (NIV) Jesus told his followers: "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your Heavenly Father feeds them. Live in the Trust that God Provides.....



Emmanuel Lutheran Council Highlights – May 4, 2020



The Emmanuel Lutheran Church Council had a virtual meeting on May 4, 2020. In attendance were Sharon Tschakert, Craig Syvertsen, Kevin Paczkowski, Fred Tol, Jessica Kappes, Lesley Hulne and Pastor Meggie.

Sharon read a thank-you note from Sheryl Ask for the Easter lilies bought in memory of Curt. The Secretary's report was given by Lesley and stood as read. The Treasurer's report submitted by Lou Ann was reviewed. Lou Ann suggested the auto withdrawal information be put in the Echo and the council agreed. Emmanuel received a small business loan for \$5,300.00 from the bank as part of the SBA Payroll Protection Program. This loan will cover payroll for Sara and Jolene for both churches, Emmanuel's share of Meggie's salary, and some utilities at Emmanuel. The funds need to be used within 60 days and is forgiven if used for the allowed expenses.

The Pastor's report was given. The "no in-person" gathering policy has been in place and the Sunday services have been available through You-Tube, Facebook, and Channel 3 of Red River Communication. Meggie has been keeping in touch with parishioners through phone calls. She would like Emmanuel to discuss when and how to resume church services. The music copyright issue is still being resolved. Kari Kleingartner has developed some logos for our use, and we thought they were great and will use them on Emmanuel letterheads, etc.

A discussion was held on funeral homes' activity in the cemetery during less than ideal ground conditions. There should be communication between the funeral home and the cemetery committee concerning the conditions before using equipment in the cemetery. There was no old business. We discussed the guidelines for Phase 1 openings as part of the ND Smart Restart Protocol. The Council does not think it is sensible to consider reopening at this time. We will revisit our plan for reopening at our June meeting. We will continue to offer services electronically. Pastor Meggie will have Communion packets available for the May 10th worship service. The new "Stitching Hearts Quilts of Valor" group asked to use the parsonage for their monthly meeting and the council agreed. Emmanuel members Deb Syvertsen and Lou Ann Lee are part of this new group. (Red River Quilters are in the space behind the balcony.)


We closed with the Lord's Prayer. The next meeting is June 1st at 6:30 PM.
