Thank you all so much for a great Meet and Greet the Pastor Day on November 14th. It was so great to become acquainted with all of you and I'm looking forward to getting to know this wonderful community. I am so blessed to be serving Emmanuel and Galchutt Lutheran churches.

Advent season is upon us and it brings many blessings, but especially the blessing of a promise, a promise from God that Jesus will come, as proclaimed in Galatians 4:4. "But when the time had fully come, God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons."

Hebrews 6:12-19 reminds us that God doesn't break his promises, and we find many promises throughout the Bible. They are an anchor for our souls, firm and secure. The Bible says that God promises to stay in "an everlasting covenant with us," and that means his promises will last forever.

Jesus is the result of God's most important promise, the promise to send us a Savior. Jesus is God's perfect Son who died and rose again to conquer sin.

What is a promise? What does it mean to make a covenant promise? A promise is a pledge or an oath to do something for someone else, no matter what. A covenant promise is an agreement between two people, it is a pledge from one person to another. Each says to the other, "I will do it, no matter what!" It is believing something will happen even before it does.

Have you ever had to wait for a promise to come true? Was it worth it? God's people waited a long time for some of God's promises to be fulfilled. The prophet Isaiah told God's people that He would someday send a Savior to them. Isaiah taught about Jesus hundreds of years before the Savior actually came to earth. God's people looked forward to seeing the answer to that promise year after year, until it finally happened.

Can you think about a time it was hard for you to keep a promise? Why is it important to keep your promises? The Bible warns against making oaths or promises that we cannot or do not want to keep. God wants us to be like Him, dependable and faithful in our promises. We thank God for His forgiveness each time we fail and we ask for God's help and wisdom in knowing how to keep our promises to each other.

What is your favorite promise from God? What makes it special to you? Let's look at some of God's promises. In Genesis 9:11-14, we discover that the rainbow is a sign of God's promise to never again flood the whole earth. In Galatians 4:4-7, we read that God promised to send His Son Jesus to be our Savior. John 17:2-3 tells us about His promise to give believers in Jesus eternal life. Jesus promised to never leave us in Matthew 28:20.

So, as we wait for Christmas, let us promise to remember the true meaning of this Day. Let us pray, Dear God, thank you for being true to Your promise to send a Savior. Your love is so great! Help us draw closer to Jesus this Christmas season and trust in the faithfulness of Your promises to us. We also pray for friends and family who do not know Jesus as their Savior. Help them see the saving love of Jesus in the midst of their festivities. Amen



The Galchutt Church Council met on November 17 at 6:30 PM at Galchutt Lutheran Church. Members present were Pamela Krump, Alex Paczkowski, Doug Johnson, Logan Biffert, Marissa Moxness, Doug Kuruc, and Pastor Janelle Hanson. Pamela called the meeting to order, and Pastor Janelle led with a devotion and prayer. Alex read last


month's secretaries report and Marissa accepted the report and Logan seconded. Pamela presented the treasury report from Kendra. Alex accepted the report and Marissa seconded. Doug Kuruc presented to the council about St. Johns church. He looked into a grant from the North Dakota Historical Society for getting the church re-shingled. He was having a hard time getting bids on shingles from local contractors. The council agreed to wait on the grant to talk with the congregation at the annual meeting on what the next steps on shingling St. Johns would be. The next time we could apply for the grant is 2 years. He also mentioned that St. John's church is registered under the Historical Society under South Wild Rice Church. Doug Kuruc asked about service of the new lawn mower. Doug Johnson will talk with RDO to see if there was a service agreement, if not Doug Kuruc will service himself. The nominating committee of Larry Wold, Pamela Krump, and Katie Nordick will look for 3 possible candidates. St John's church is still being worked on. All the studs have been replaced. Pastor's Report: Pastor Janelle is doing some nursing home visitations as well as

home and hospital visits. She attended the Synod Conference meeting and will go to the ELCA Youth Summit and training in Minneapolis. Janelle submitted mileage for October, and Tessa made a motion to approve the mileage, Sharon seconded the motion and it carried.

Secretary's Report: The report was given and approved, with a change of the November meeting date, in a motion by Craig and second by Sharon.

Only Matthew records the holy family's "flight into Egypt," linking Advent with Lent and Christmas with Good Friday. In an article titled "Joy to the World/Pain in the World," James I. Cook expresses gratitude that Matthew documents the slaughter of the innocents: "I turn to it again and again, when someone I know loses a loved one at the height of the Christmas season. It helps me — and I hope it helps them — to

remember that theirs are not the first tears to fall on Christmas; to recall that there has never been a Christmas of pure peace and happiness; [to recognize] that 'joy to the world' has always been sung to the accompaniment of much 'pain in the world.'" —adapted from Homiletics



The example of Mary

"We must look to Mary's example to know how to deal with the glorious impossibilities of God," writes Calvin Miller in The Christ of Christmas. "Look how she turned the world upside down by making one simple statement."

Jesus surely could have come to earth without Mary's aid. But God seems to prefer partnering with people to accomplish miracles such as salvation and healing. So God chooses Mary to carry the Savior. Later, Jesus often declares people's own faith crucial to their healing. And today, God works justice through us, not apart from us.

God doesn't force us into collaboration. Yet, notes Miller, "God needs only a little of our agreement in order to work mighty wonders." Like Mary's humble assent: "I am the Lord's servant. ... May your word to me be fulfilled" (Luke 1:38, NIV). And like yours — for whatever partnership God invites you into. God will do the heavy lifting, for certain, but he hopes you'll say yes.
