As we have been journeying with Jonah into the unfinished depths of Lent, we now come to Holy week-Maundy Thursday, when we remember Jesus sharing that last meal with those simple men of faith, and Good Friday, when we witness Jesus' suffering and death on the cross. However, it's three days later when we

hear of the joy and amazement surrounding the resurrection of this beloved son.

And why the elation? The fire that lit the boiler of the New Testament church was an unquenchable belief that if Jesus had been only a man, he would have stayed in the tomb. Witnesses couldn't remain silent because the one they saw hanging on the cross walked once again on the earth appearing to five hundred people! I wonder sometimes why we remain silent? Have we forgotten the man who was tortured on the cross? The impossible miracle that occurred three days later?


Let us ask our Father humbly, yet confidently, in the name of Jesus, to remind us of the empty tomb. Let us see the victories of Jesus, the conqueror of the tomb, the one who defied death. And let us be reminded that we too will be granted that same victory!

Kate Bowler offers up this prayer of hopefulness in her book, <u>The Lives We Actually Have: 100</u> <u>Blessings for Imperfect Days</u>:

Oh God, I stretch out my hands to you in this early Easter darkness. I need you to pull me up and set me on my feet again, for I am weak and tired. God have mercy. Christ, have mercy. Spirit, have mercy. God, on that first Easter morning, while it was still dark, one woman went alone to the tomb to do what could be done to honor you, though hope had drained away. Two bright angels met her there and then, how is it possible? You were there, fully alive, beyond belief. Blessed are we who stretch out our hands to you in doubt and grief, in sickness of body and mind and spirit, our prayers not fully realized, rejoicing anyway. For that is what makes us Easter people. Carrying forth the realized hope of the Resurrected One, singing our alleluias great and small while it is still dark. Christ is Risen. Christ will come again. Alleluia! Alleluia!

I wish you the most blessed Easter now and forever more! Let us pray. Thank you for the sweet surprise of Easter morning. We are thankful that when you arose from your sleep of death, you didn't go immediately to heaven; instead, you rose and reached out to others. A Grand Entrance

Decades ago, as English actress Gertrude Lawrence waited behind the curtain for a play to begin, the queen upstaged her by arriving at the royal box to much applause. "What an entrance," Lawrence remarked, to which her friend, playwright Noel Coward, replied, "What a part!"

Jesus certainly made a grand entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, entering to adoring shouts of "Hosanna!" But worldly glory and fame

weren't his intent. Instead, our Lord knew that his Father had prepared a sacrificial role for him. Jesus handled the adulation with dignity and poise. The humble yet courageous Son of God knew that danger, despair and death awaited — but that he must endure it all to fulfill prophecy for humanity's sake.

The pageantry of Palm Sunday is a stark contrast to the role of Suffering Servant that Jesus faced a few short days later. Yet each event during Holy Week represents victory — for Jesus as well as for his beloved children.

Palm Sunday is a glorious day, so let us wave palms and shout, "Hosanna in the highest heaven!" The Savior has come. What an entrance! What a part!

Why Christ calls us to worship

Easter services are usually well attended, but what about other weeks? What draws you to worship on an "average" Sunday, and what might Jesus have in store for people in the pews?

Consider this from Pastor Charles Aaron: "Did we come to church this morning thinking it was a safe thing to do? Did we come with some expectation of receiving a blessing, a bit of comfort, but no real challenge? Did we think about the possibility that encountering Jesus would rearrange our lives, explode our priorities, cause us to give more than we ever expected? Did we think we could get a little something from Jesus, a dose of grace to help us through the week? Did we come for the fellowship, the music, the spiritual boost? No one can argue with those reasons."


He continues: "The risen Christ, however, may have had other plans for this worship service. Christ may want to come under our skins and transform us. Christ may see through us so that something we have well hidden comes to the surface. Christ may kick out from under us the things we use to prop ourselves up but that we don't really need. Are we ready for that? Did we bargain on that when we walked through the door today?" -from The Wired Word

Jesus answers our uncertainties

Thomas didn't believe the other disciples when they said Jesus had risen. The two travelers to Emmaus despaired over Jesus' death, uncertain what might come next.

During our life of faith, we all face questions, doubts and despair. In Fearless, Max Lucado says Jesus' responses to us echo his responses to the disciples. His answer to our doubt is the same as with Thomas: "Touch my body" — which we do every time we connect with the church (the body of Christ), wounds and all. As with the Emmaus disciples, Jesus urges us to ponder his story found in Scripture which we do through Bible reading and study. Today, just as long ago, Jesus meets his followers — in his body, in his Word —
